What is a Good Neighbour Scheme?

Across Oxfordshire there are more than 50 Good Neighbour Schemes offering help in the local community.

Most of these groups offer assistance with essential transport, for example, taking people to and from hospital, doctors' surgeries and other medical appointments.

Some groups offer other services, such as befriending, shopping, help with gardening and small DIY jobs.

All Good Neighbour Schemes are different and it's up to the residents of the area to decide what services they would like to be available.



How to set up a Good Neighbour Scheme

Anyone can become involved in setting up a Good Neighbour Scheme. Here are some steps to give you an idea of what's involved:

- Establish whether there is a need for a scheme in your community. You could do this by sending out a questionnaire.
- 2. Hold a public meeting to identify members of the community who might be interested in getting involved.
- **3.** Form a steering group to oversee the running of the scheme. A good size for a group is between five and ten people.
- Decide how your scheme will be coordinated - will it have a single coordinator or several?
- 5. Decide what services/activities your scheme will offer.
- 6. Assign members of the steering group to particular roles e.g. funding, publicity, insurance and DBS checks.
- 7. Hold an information evening to encourage people to sign-up and volunteer.
- 8. When the scheme has a few volunteers in place, publicise locally through the use of cards/flyers delivered to homes or by advertising in local publications.
- 9. Begin taking requests from clients.
- **10.** When the scheme has been operating for a month or so hold a launch party to generate as much publicity as possible.
